


Community Resilience Project

Let's learn from each other about improving energy efficiency in our homes. Further to our article earlier this year, we now have dates and times for two tours of local properties that may be of interest to local people who would like to explore practical solutions for upgrading their homes.

On **Saturday June 15th from 3pm**, tour 1 will visit three whole-house projects.



The straw bale house at Pentiddy,





and the Burntwood Eco house on the Golberdon Road.

All three were effectively newbuilds and demonstrate different approaches to building an energy-efficient home. Many of the ideas and techniques can be put to use on much smaller-scale projects. The tour will last around. 2 to 2.5 hours.

On **Thursday June 27th from 7pm**, tour 2 will visit three older cottages where measures have been taken, or are being taken, to improve energy performance. They range from relatively minor projects to a full refurbishment.




The cottages are at Gang, Shute Lane and Middle Hill. As well as seeing the improvements themselves, you will be able to talk to the householders about what it involved and, in at least one case, to hear about a couple's experience of the grant application process. This tour will last approximately 1.5 to 2 hours.

Pensilva WI

A journey of over 6,000 miles made by a woman in a time (1900) when this would have been unheard of was the introduction to this month's talk. Daniéla Barnard (Attractions Manager at "The story of Emily" in St Ive) spoke about the life of Emily Hobhouse, including her work in the Anglo-Boer war and the exciting development of the Rectory and grounds where Emily was born and lived until she was 34.

From a young age, growing up in Cornwall, Emily always wanted more. Eventually, she was appointed secretary of the women's branch of the South African Conciliation Committee, went onto found the Distress Fund for South African Women and Children then sailed to Cape Colony to distribute this.

She discovered the many camps and the poor conditions in these and gained widespread recognition in South Africa for her work with the women and children in the camps. She championed hope and left behind a legacy of compassion. "Liberty is the equal right and heritage of every child of man, without distinction of race, colour or sex." (Emily Hobhouse 1913). Her life was full of involvement in many causes.

The site in St. Ive is a bridge between the events in South Africa and her childhood home in Cornwall, telling her story. The Rectory is a glimpse into Emily's life in 1875 and is open from 16th May. The restaurant will be serving delicious heritage food, the gardens and grounds (including the 'mound' with a telescope at the top!) are available to explore. At a later date, the war rooms will also be open to experience. More details can be found on the website: **thestoryofemily.com**





Warning: Lookout for Asian Hornets!

Beekeepers call on the public to help fight record Asian hornet invasion

The British Beekeepers' Association (BBKA) is calling on the public to help fight a major threat to honey bees and other pollinators - Asian hornets.

Numbers of the destructive insect have risen rapidly this summer and more have been detected in the UK this year than in the previous six years combined.

BBKA Chair, Diane Drinkwater, released a statement in Spring 2023 saying: "At this early stage of the Asian hornet season, which goes on into the autumn, it is extremely worrying to see so many cases and so early. We must act now to stop them from getting established in this country.

"Reports from Europe and Jersey indicate that 2023 was an exceptional year for Asian hornets with record numbers of queens and nests. We urge the public to join forces with beekeepers to protect our honey bees and other pollinators from this voracious predator."

More than 1,000 beekeepers across the country are part of elite teams trained to provide emergency support to the National Bee Unit's (NBU) hornet hunters.

Hornet sightings are filtered by the NBU, part of Defra, and teams of bee inspectors deployed to track hornets back to their nests which are then destroyed.

But the help of the eagle-eyed public is essential to spot the hornets which may be devouring insects or feeding on fallen fruit or ivy flowers.

Asian hornets (Vespa velutina) are slightly smaller than native European hornets, have yellow legs, an orange face and brown body with one yellow stripe.

This summer beekeeper Mick Brian discovered an Asian hornet in his garden in Plymouth which eventually led to the destruction of two nests: "We watched in stunned silence as the insect singled out a honey bee, carried it to a nearby leaf, and began to dissect it."

Just one Asian hornet can hunt down and eat 300 honey bees a day and their habit of hawking (hovering) outside the hive stops the bees from collecting nectar and pollen to feed themselves.

Diane added: "Asian hornets are wreaking havoc in Europe and we fear if they get a foot-hold in the UK our honey bees and many other insects will be decimated here, too.

"They are the greatest threat to beekeeping since the Varroa mite was discovered more than 30 years ago."

It is important to take care not to approach or disturb a nest. Asian hornets are not generally aggressive towards people but an exception to this is when they perceive a threat to their nest.

People who suspect they have seen an Asian hornet should report it immediately using the phone app 'Asian Hornet Watch' or to the NBU.

Update on Aid for Ukraine

Firstly, Nightingales UK would like to thank everyone who has supported them and they are immensely grateful for the generosity they have received from the local community.

They work alongside Koridor UA; a non-profit humanitarian organisation, which has an ever-expanding logistic network, taking aid where it is most needed to villages and hospitals in the Odessa, Mykolayiv and Kherson regions. Much of this aid is sent directly to the frontline. Nightingales UK is proud to be responsive and flexible, focusing on delivering only what their colleagues in Ukraine are particularly requesting. Using non-profit partners in this way, enables Nightingales UK to use donated money in the most efficient, secure and effective way, reassuring donors of the best use of their funds.

Much of their funding comes from events and on the 20th of April, Ivor Vaughan and friends managed to raise an amazing £281.23 at Millenium House by holding a cake sale. It was a very warm spirited event and once again, we were overwhelmed by the generosity of the aid donations that we received on the day.

One of their next planned fundraising events will be a Ukranian musical event held on the 24th of August in the Wharf, Tavistock. This is Ukraines' Independence Day, which also happily coincides with Nightingales launch day anniversary and should be a very special night for all.

Nightingales are already planning their next trip in June with the aim of delivering their 6th long wheel base 4 x 4 vehicle filled with vital medical and humanitarian aid to Uzhhorod, Ukraine; to be left and used as an ambulance.

On a more sobering note, I would like to forward an extract from a transcript sent



by Olena Mosiychuk, a Paramedic who is considered a national hero in Ukraine; who wrote the following message to Nightingales UK:

"Thanks to you here in Ukraine, we have the opportunity to help our military and civilians. First of all, I want to thank you for the vehicles provided. These vehicles help to evacuate the wounded. Unfortunately, there is no time to record or photograph our work because the enemy drones are working on the front line. There are so many of them that when you raise your head up, the sky is black and the sun is not visible. The enemy attacks with Kamakahi drones 24/7. They are launched in their hundreds and fly in the direction of cars. If we turn on our phones or some kind of video camera, a drone will immediately fly in and explode.

We do not just save human life on the frontline but animals too and bring them back to my shelter. All humanitarian aid that you provide is transferred to the war zone or grey zone, where there are no shops due to constant shelling.

We convey our deepest gratitude to you for your work and for your enormous contribution, which has helped save in recent months more than 300 wounded miliary and more than 500 civilians, wounded during shelling of civilian cities and villages.

Every day we thank the universe and God for your help and for your opportunity to provide it".

It's been a busy and exciting start to Spring! The funding we received earlier in the year from Cornwall Council's Community Capacity Fund has kept us busy as we liaise with consultants to look at the feasibility of spaces for education and enterprise.

We have since heard that we've also been successful with our bid to Awards for All through The National Lottery which will enable us to engage a 'Community Enterprise Builder' to continue building relationships, connections & providing opportunities for involvement. This will also help us to prepare for launching our community share offer in 2025 so that Tregovenek can be community-owned.

We have a team of volunteers busily designing our community garden and getting ready to launch a crowdfunder to help us fund creating it! Keep a look out for this in June.

Great fun was had at the willow workshop in April run by Pensiva's own Jessie



Carr. The feedback from the course was fantastic so there will be many more courses to follow.

We are just about to start conducting ecological surveys with help from the University of Plymouth so that we have a baseline from which to measure the improvements we make to the land over the years through a variety of regenerative farming methods. A less formal survey of the land will be taking place at our mid-summer picnic and bioblitz (see opposite page for details) to which everyone is very welcome! If you have any experience of identifying grasses, flowers, trees, birds or insects we'd be extra keen to hear from you!!

As in previous years, we will be offering tours of Tregovenek and Pentiddy Woods in one visit to include the straw bale house, natural burial site, community woodland, working coppice, off-grid systems, no-dig and forest gardening at Pentiddy Woods as well as a chance to hear about all the plans for Tregovenek and a look at the work we've completed so far. This year they will take place on Sunday 14th July, 3-5pm & Saturday 10th August 10am -12pm and will be on a donations basis. 



Gardening Club Report

On Monday 13th May 2024 we visited Antony Woodland Gardens. Many think this is part of Antony House, but it's actually a separate venue. To reach it a long drive down the same lane as the entrance to Antony House is required; so people will be forgiven for assuming it's all the same.

In some ways we were lucky the visit went ahead after the horrendous rain all through the day, but we were pleased it did as Antony Woodland Gardens were a true delight.

We were greeted by Richard, the Head Gardener. He explained we were the first group to visit during the evening which was a surprise. Richard explained the gardens and woodland were part of Antony House, but when the house and surrounding land was handed over to the National Trust, the gardens and woodland were kept separate as they were the best parts!

There are two sections to explore: wilderness, and West Down. The wilderness was first planted in the 18th Century. There are clumps of trees, a series of rides which are formal abd straight so they can be seen from the House. These rides are the formal part of the very informal gardens. Richard explained he tries not to have much formality in the garden, and this can be seen when walking around; signs placed on fallen tree trunks for example. There are two walks: a shorter one, and a longer one. There are benches to take a moment, to take in the beauty; they are homemade benches or made of granite fitting in with the informal values.

As we set off for our exclusive, private visit we split into two groups: one taking the longer route, the other taking the shorter route. I was with the shorter route so if you want to know what's on the longer route, you will need to visit the gardens!

As we started our walk we could easily see the many rhododendrons with a rainbow of colours; tones of pink, purple, red, orange and yellow. Richard's words came back to me as we saw the camellias coming into view, it is easy to see how the gardens are an international camellia garden of excellence. The vibrant colours of the flowers against the familiar green leaves was a sight to behold. The days rain had left rain-droplets which twinkled in the setting sun on the camellia flower petals.

As we followed the path around we reached the bath pool with a backdrop of trees, many lowering their branches into the water. t was easy to imagine the private area being used as a bathing pool in the past. As we walked around the corner we could see the setting sun again, its rays peering through the trees by the water. A short walk to an opening in the trees with a granite bench to look out over the water, the orange sky beaming out towards the House.


We walked up through a guard of honour of camellias and rhododendrons. The end was a view of the house in the distance - what views they have!

We walked back up to the starting point and then around a carpet of wild garlic and bluebells with the birds serenading the pink, orange and blue sunset.

The visit was well worth chancing the weather. A wonderful place full of hidden delights & surprises.

THIRTEEN+ YEARS OF WILDLIFE WATCHING IN THE PARISH OF ST. IVE

Since moving to the Parish at the end of 2009, I have been photographing and recording the wildlife which I see at my home on the edge of Pensilva on a daily basis. This month I am again diverting into one of the areas I am least knowledgeable about, insects - so this is a learning exercise for me too! The insect in question is one of our beautiful butterflies...



...THE PAINTED LADY

This painted lady was photographed on one of our buddleias, a plant which many butterflies frequent. In the shot above, it is sharing the flower with a bee. The topside of its wing (see below) is bright orange with black markings and a U shape of white spots



at the top of the wing. The underwing (see above) is similar, but with a larger dark patch on the lower wing, which is quite delicately marked if you look closely. Look on line if you want to find coloured examples.

It has long been known that this butterfly migrates. However it is only after a recent ambitious piece of citizen science across a number of countries, that the whole, fascinating story was finally pieced together. We already knew that Painted Ladies

arrived from abroad every summer, but there was no evidence to show where they went or whether they just died here at the end of the season.

A number of academic establishments including the University of York, co-ordinated the project. In 2009, 10,000 British observers registered more than 60,000 observations which were collated with radar images tracking butterfly movements across southern Britain. From this they were able to confirm that the Painted Ladies *did* fly south, but at a height of over 500 metres in order to use air currents to speed their journey and explaining why this migration had not previously been observed. But this was only the start of the story. By extending their research area, they established that this species takes a 9,000 mile round trip stretching from the African Tropics to the Arctic Circle!

No single Painted Lady will make this trip, rather it is a relay of four to six generations which annually complete this feat. At each stop on the journey through the year, they will find the appropriate local plants on which to lay their eggs. The caterpillars will hatch and feed on thistles, nettles and mallows, before pupating and eventually emerging as an adult butterfly. They will then feed up on nectar to build up their strength for the next leg of the relay. These tiny creatures with no chance to learn from parents, (who will never have taken the same journey that they are about to undertake anyway) will instinctively start out in the right direction.



Far from being helplessly at the mercy of the elements as we previously thought, the Painted Lady is an instinctive and accomplished traveller. Thanks to all the scientists, technicians and amateur enthusiasts, we know that in 2009, 11 million Painted Ladies arrived in the Spring, and 26 million left in the Autumn. This reflects the need for them to breed successfully at every leg of their journey so as to ensure that enough individuals reach their destinations to make up for the inevitable casualties on such hazardous routes.

Whilst the Painted Lady is not currently seen to be 'at risk' it is not difficult to see that if either climate change or human land usage were to deplete the plants both the caterpillars and the adults need to survive at <u>any</u> point on this relay, they could then quickly become vulnerable. You can do your bit by thinking about this beautiful visitor and choosing butterfly friendly plants for your garden or window box.






