# Letter from the Editor

What a funny month it's been. The conservatives were finally kicked out of Cornwall; someone managed to take a shot at Trump despite being in the sights of secret service snipers twenty minutes before; we found out the previous government spent £700 million sending four people to Rwanda; meanwhile some protestors are jailed for five years for the heinous crime of ... blocking traffic; and the UN estimates that by 2050, 95% of all farmland will be degraded to the point nothing can be harvested. That sounds... problematic.

#### A false dawn.

Now that the farce of democracy is over and I'm free of purdah laws (an antiquated bit of legislation which means as the editor of a village newsletter funded by the parish council I'm not allowed an opinion), I can speak candidly once again.

It appears to me that our democracy is well and truly broken. Labour won the largest majority not because more people voted for them (in fact, Starmer got less votes than the "unelectable" Corbyn), but because a lot of the Tory vote either didn't turn up, or defected to Reform UK.

I find it disgusting that a party like Reform UK can garner 14% of the total votes, yet end up with only a handful of seats. I don't agree with their policies in the slightest, but I'll fight for their right to be represented fairly. If 14% of the country voted for them, they should have 14% of the say in our governance. No wonder turnout was so abysmal. My vote would be Lib Dem any day, but the fact they got less votes (12%)—yet somehow managed to get 71 seats—is obscene. That's just not democratic.

Nothing will ever change unless we have proportional representation; but neither side of a two-party system will implement any policy that disadvantages them. Opponents will say that it leads only to a chaotic coalition government; it seems to work fine throughout Europe though. And so what if we have a coalition? One party shouldn't get their way all the time, and the policies that do get implemented should be a compromise between represented views of the country. That's what moderation is. Wouldn't it be amazing if we could just vote how we wanted to, and not have to think about tactical voting?

### Then I remember: If voting changed anything, they would make it illegal.

Our government may have changed in name, but the fundamental policies are identical. We must grow the economy, they say. I've found that whenever I read the word "economy", I can safely exchange it with "rich people's yachts", and it makes a lot more sense. Here,

try this:



(Side note: it took all of five seconds to edit the BBC website and fake that screenshot, which is why you shouldn't believe any screenshots until you confirm at the source!)

The Economy is measured by GDP, or Gross Domestic Product, which is basically the sum of all goods produced over the year. That includes happy things like ice creams, and electric cars—as well as nasty things like burglar alarms, tanks, and missiles. The amount of "stuff" we churn out seems like a really poor measure of anything. How about we start optimising for happiness instead?

I know we're all hoping for Sir Keir to reverse the decline in our quality of life, the cost of living, the degradation of public services... but I don't think he can. We shouldn't be hoping for infinite growth to make our lives better on a planet of finite resources; we should managing the decline gracefully, cutting out the uneccessary waste, and planning for what comes next.

In other news, I want to thank Vanessa and everyone else who helped to bring back and participated in Pensilva Carnival this year: the exhibitors, the generous donors to the raffle, and the attendees who braved the weather. Despite the horrid rain, we are incredibly lucky to have a large community centre and the management skills to pull off an indoor Carnival; other villages just had to cancel.

Here's to another glorious carnival next year—but let's not forget all the other brilliant events that go on year round (like the Film Club's showing of Barbie this month!)

# Chairman's Report

Ever watched one of those films where the sound is way out of sync with the action? Well, writing this article is a bit like that. I have to get this to the Editor, James by the 15th of the month yet you won't read it (hopefully!!) for at least another fortnight. The problem is that things which are current now (our new government) or in a few days (Pensilva Carnival Day) are history by now so there's no need to mention them!

What is topical, however is the new Community Transport Vehicle which is due to be delivered any day soon. At the time of writing we are just awaiting the vinyls (what we used to call signwriting) to be applied. The delays caused by a worldwide shortage of components needed to convert the vehicle to be wheelchair accessible are now behind us and we can look forward to having this great resource for many years to come thanks to a most generous donation from the now disbanded Friends of the Pensilva Health Centre.

Established in 1988, the FRIENDS in recent times has suffered from dwindling numbers, in particular younger people willing to take the group forward. Sadly the decision was taken to disband the group and disburse the remaining funds. It was at the July Parish Council meeting that I was presented with a cheque for a considerable amount from Cllr Ivor Vaughan who explained that the funds had accumulated over many years. These funds will be used to purchase a battery to store power from the solar panels on the roof of Millennium House so the vehicle can be still charged even on a dull day or when the sun has set.

Having purchased this equipment, all surplus funds will go towards the running and upkeep of the vehicle in the future. I'm sure you will agree that the community transport vehicle will greatly help those in our area who struggle to get around (caused not in a small way by our shrinking bus service run mainly for the benefit of the bus company rather than their passengers).

What the above doesn't tell though, is the sheer amount of hard work and sacrifice by many people over many years which has culminated in this fantastic project. I offer them all, on behalf of the whole community, our heartfelt thanks.

You may be wondering where "Observations pt 2" has got to - maybe next month might be a "quiet news day" so you may get it then! Until then, take care.

# NEIGHBOURHOOD NEIGHB

We are pleased to be able to share some of the results/feedback from the recent Questionnaire for the Neighbourhood Plan. Further more comprehensive results will be published in the next edition of the Parish Pump.

During the consultation period 637 people [28% of the Parish community] visited the online site and found out more about the Plan. 107 people [5%] then contributed to the survey either via the online site or by paper forms. Of these, 78 people made additional comments.

We wanted to know people's thoughts on different forms of sustainable development and what sort of things new planning policies might cover.

Not all issues can be controlled through a Neighbourhood Plan - it is about things that require Planning Permission and can be controlled through Cornwall Council's Planning powers.

However, we want to know about some other local issues too, as this will be useful information for the Parish Council to use in its work.

An extract of some of the Survey Results:

# The Top 3 Things that people like most about living in St Ive & Pensilva Parish:

- 1. The countryside and landscape
- 2. The peace and tranquility
- 3. Local Wildlife and Biodiversity

# Which public amenities and facilities should be protected - the Top Five from the results:

- 1. GP Surgery 97%
- 2. Pensilva village shop 89%
- 3. Post Office Facility 80%
- 4. Millennium House 77%
- 5. Playing fields and sports facilities 76%

# The 3 most important things that the Neighbourhood Plan could do to protect the built environment?

- 1. Ensure development is in harmony with the rural character of the neighbourhood and sits well in the landscape.
- 2. Require new buildings to reflect local Cornish building traditions in design, appearance and layout.
- 3. Require building design to be in keeping with the scale, height, location, density

# The top 3 road safety improvements needed?

- 1. Improved public footpath maintenance
- 2. Low speed limits (i.e., 20 MPH areas)
- 3. Extend speed limit areas

#### The top 3 community safety concerns?

- 1. Dog fouling
- 2. Littering
- 3. Fly tipping

So what happens next?

We will write the draft Neighbourhood Plan to reflect what people have told us, then do a formal 6 week-long consultation where you will be able to see the proposed policies and comment upon them. After adjustment, the Plan will be submitted to Cornwall Council. After that, the Plan will go through an Independent Examination, who will check that it conforms to the regulations governing Neighbourhood Planning, is in conformity with national and Cornwall level strategic planning policies and delivers "sustainable development".

If the Plan passes the Examination, a local referendum will be arranged by Cornwall Council, in which all those registered to vote in St Ive & Pensilva Parish will have a vote. If the Plan is supported at the referendum, it is formally adopted by Cornwall Council and must be taken into account when planning applications are decided.



# Update on Aid for Ukraine

I was saddened to hear last week on the news about the KYIV Ukrainian Children's Cancer Hospital, which was bombed and severely damaged. This is a hospital that the Nightingales team currently support with humanitarian aid. War seems so senseless and at the heart of it, there are always innocent adults and children caught up in conflict.



During June's trip to Ukraine, Tim one of the team members relayed this message:

"One of the things that stuck in my mind this trip was standing on the platform at Kyiv Station seeing so many soldiers saying goodbye to their loved ones before going off to the front lines. What must have been going through their heads? Will I ever see my husband, boyfriend, son, brother, children again. Seeing all the destroyed military equipment in Kyiv and the fallen flags in the square representing all the fallen soldiers was heart wrenching".

On the 9th of July the Nightingales team collected another van full of aid to take to Ukraine. On the 21st of July members of the team left the country taking two 4 x 4 vehicles of medical aid, and our team will shortly be on their way with a third vehicle containing food aid and medication. Amazingly, news of the Nightingales aid work has reached as far away as Bermuda.

Unfortunately, we can now no longer accept Pet food due to a change in regulations and restrictions on the borders.



Once again, I am humbled by the kindness and generosity of all those in and outside of our community who believe in and support this cause. Thank you for your donations at the Pensilva Carnival Table Top Sale, which was a great success. YOUR generous contributions are making a huge and

vital difference.

There is always strength in Unity and the power of that unity lights a way for those who feel hopeless and lost. Every box which left Pensilva, had a message written on it saying "Love, Peace and Hope to Ukraine, so that the Ukrainian people in their despair, know that they have not been forgotten. I even had a little helper, whose grandad donated some medication, help me write messages of support onto the boxes.

The cost of purchasing a secondhand ambulance is £5,000 and Nightingales are continually looking for unwanted long wheel base 4 x 4 vehicles that have a minimal amount of tax and MOT; which can be donated and driven one way filled with aid. These vehicles act as ambulances to rescue military and civilian casualties from the front line once they reach Ukraine.



# Gardening Club Report

On Monday 1st July we visited Deviock Farm near Cardinham, Bodmin. The journey began as usual from the car park in St Ive. However, the entire journey didn't go as usual, as I took a wrong turn...with everyone else following. Instead of going direct to the address we all did a long loop to get there! But we made it.

After driving down a long, meandering lane we parked up and were greeted by Sue and Bernie; owners of the property. We headed out of the drive and down towards the garden. The first item we were introduced to was a leaning tree! The tree is huge, very tall and is leaning at such an angle the first thought is that it's been blown down in a strong winds! However, Sue explained that it has simply grown that way, leaning into its friend next to it. As much as it's a talking point and visually pleasing Sue and Bernie are concerned it might actually fall one day.

Stood at the top of the garden where Sue told us they arrived 19 years ago to an area covered in mud after cows had spent a lot of time making their perfect home. The area we were standing in was a lawn of lush, green grass with flower beds dotted in between. One of the beds was home to a selection of rose bushes, a variety of colour and heights. The lawn sloped down to a planted area of calla lilies, goats beard and common mullein against a backdrop of ferns.

We walked down the slope to the left in front of us was a large pond which wouldn't look out of place in a stately home garden. The giant rhubarb at the end of the pond certainly lived up to its name.

Sue informed us the garden has many visitors including those of the animal kind. Squirrels are a very frequent visitor and they take away more than they leave behind. This was evident in the missing bark on one of the trees. Deer, bees, hedgehogs, rabbits, foxes and badgers are among the other regulars who enjoy the garden.

The rabbits like to eat the wild seeds but thankfully they don't eat all the seed as the wild patch is thriving. Complete with paths so you can immerse yourself in the calmness. Its neighbour is a bug garden full of oxide daisies bathing in the evening sunlight.

We walked around to the other side of the bug garden to see the efforts of Sue & Bernie's lockdown project. Whilst creating the garden they found the wheel pit which was filled

with stone and mud. They dug out the pit until they reached the granite at the bottom. The water still runs into the pit giving it an authentic feel even though the wheel is sadly long gone.

The garden next to the pit provides a country feel with foxgloves, nasturtiums, oxide daisies and pink campions.

The garden slopes down to a natural woodland with paths circling around the interlinking trees, under the overlapping canopy of branches and leaves. Bracken and bluebells take turns to cover the woodland floor

Heading back up the sloped garden passed the towering thistles and foxgloves, around the bug garden and to the very well cared for vegetable garden we made our way to the house.

A fabulous, natural garden which has taken a lot of work to provide a garden with a bit of everything.

# THIRTEEN+ YEARS OF WILDLIFE WATCHING IN THE PARISH OF ST. IVE

Since moving to the Parish at the end of 2009, I have been photographing and recording the wildlife which I see at my home on the edge of Pensilva on a daily basis. This month I am looking at a small mammal which we see in our garden and on one memorable occasion, in our car! More details later, but it is ...





Wood mice are sometimes known as field mice or long-tailed field mice. This hints at a wider use of habitat than just woodland. Indeed, they can also be found in farmland, scrub, heathland, parks and gardens. They will occasionally use buildings in harsh winters, but should not be confused with the larger house mouse. Wood mice are largely brown with pale fur on their underparts. They have a long hairless tail (about 8cm) and a body about 10cm long. Although they sometimes have a yellowish area of fur under their necks, it is unlike the continuous band across the necks of their much rarer close cousins, the yellow-necked mice.

Wood mice are omnivores, feeding largely on fruit nuts and seeds, adding caterpillars,

worms and other invertebrates to their diet in spring. In autumn, they will also eat blackberries and fungi. Their love of seeds will sometimes bring them to forage under the birdfeeders, so giving an occasional chance to view them. They also make use of bird nests, holes in trees and bird or dormouse boxes to eat their food in safety They are one of three



small rodents (along with bank voles and dormice) to make round holes in hazelnuts to get to the nut. Their nuts have holes with tiny ridges going up and down the rim and scratch marks on the nut around the hole. If you don't manage to see a wood mouse, you may well find these signs when walking in the woods.



Wood mice make their homes in complicated underground burrows, including nest chambers and food stores. It is thought that these survive from one generation to the next, being modified and extended as required. The nest chambers are lined with moss, grass and leaves. They will often block the entrances to tunnels with twigs, leaves and stones. Whilst they will live communally in winter, in the breeding season, females will usually establish their own territory for nesting. Again, these will sometimes be found

in nest boxes. The nests I have seen when undertaking my duties as a dormouse monitor, have consisted of a mass of chopped up leaves.

Wood mice also form an important part of the food chain, falling prey to many natural predators, such as weasels, stoats, foxes, owls and kestrels. In addition, they also fall prey to our cats. As a result of this, they are largely nocturnal and stay undercover as much as possible, but they still rarely live more than a year in the wild. They will occasionally escape a predator by shedding the skin from their tails, but cannot regrow this. In addition, many do not survive the winter. They do not hibernate, but have been known to go into a state of torpor during exceptionally cold weather.

As they are so short lived, successful breeding is imperative for the survival of the species. Between February and October, females can produce litters of four to eight young up to six times a year. The young stay with their mother for about twenty days and they reach sexual maturity after about two months. When food supplies are

plentiful, breeding may continue over winter.

Now back to the visitor in our car. A few years ago, we noticed the seed filled neck pillow in the door pocket had been nibbled away at. Further investigation found a stash of seeds around the spare tyre under the boot. We put in a humane trap and soon found the culprit waiting for us to release it. We started by taking it across the stream - not far enough! On four occasions it reappeared, being deposited further and further away until it eventually didn't return. As we had only seen it in



the car and boot, we thought that was that until the car developed an electrical fault and the garage diagnosed "rodent damage". A very expensive visitor!

Despite this vandalism the wood mouse is still an endearing and welcome visitor to the garden!






