You may remember, in last month's issue, my wondering if this would be a "quiet news day" but I'm delighted to say it's turned into a "Red Letter Day" instead!!

For 11 months now we have been anticipating the arrival of our new Community Transport Vehicle, and now after all this time it is sitting on the car park of Millennium House (unless of course, it's out on a "job". For those who haven't yet seen it in all its glory, it's on the front cover of this issue!

Looks very smart, I'm sure you'll agree. We can now look forward to many years of very useful service and it will be a great asset to this community. I understand that next month there'll be an article in here about how the booking system will work.

Another great idea we are pursuing is the installation of a battery unit to harness the power we glean from the solar panels on the roof of Millennium House. These batteries are a fairly recent innovation and really help to capitalise on the free energy we get from the sun. By storing this energy, plant such as the coolers for the Mel Bar which run 24/7 can effectively run on electricity generated during the day, slashing our energy bills overnight.

Millennium House is a wonderful community facility able to host so many diverse events but remember its success depends on the community itself using it. By the time you read this, it is hoped that the New Community Vehicle will have been delivered.

The project began just as the Covid 19 Pandemic hit us in January 2020. The aim was to provide a community service for shopping, group travel, hospital and GP appointments etc.

Initially a vehicle was provided by Cornwall County Council and with the help of volunteers drivers, the service proved invaluable in getting people to and from Millennium House to receive their vaccinations. After a few weeks the vehicle had to be returned to the County Council.

It is with heartfelt thanks to Councillor Alan Moss that three plus years ago, he started on a project to find a way to purchase our own vehicle to provide a much needed service for the local community. Alan has given much time and dedication over the years. He applied for and was awarded a Lottery Grant for the purchase of a 7-seater vehicle. More time passed as alterations were needed for carrying a wheelchair plus the vinyls to be applied.

A sincere thanks also to our dedicated volunteer drivers who, since having had to return the original vehicle, have given their time AND use of their own vehicles to provide a vital service to the Community. We could not have done it without you.....

#### Raising funds for a community garden that will be 'A Place of Hope'

Tregovenek (A Place of Hope) is a new community farm on the edge of Pensilva, in Southeast Cornwall. It is led by volunteers with a desire to build something special for everyone in the wider community, as well as future generations.

Tregovenek isn't funded by a large organisation or network, it is a Community Benefit Society, starting from scratch and taking one step at a time! Currently, the focus is growing a community garden, and the team have launched a crowdfunder to raise £15,000 to fund the vital infrastructure to build a thriving space for people and nature.

'This is such an important part of the wider project' says Hayley Rogers, a member of Tregovenek's Garden Circle. 'The garden will be the first place people see when they visit Tregovenek.

This will be a place where people can improve their health and well-being, get their hands in the soil, make new friends, learn how to grow food and other land-based skills. Already local school children and university students have been part of it, and more groups will be able to experience it.

We want it to be a beautiful, welcoming space that encourages everyone to feel at home and return again and again! It will include a tree nursery, fire pit, pathways, growing beds, seating areas, compost toilet facilities, gathering space for courses, workshops, celebrations, funerals, meetings or social events. We will work closely with other community groups to enhance the biodiversity and natural abundance in this area. Anyone who donates can proudly know that they are contributing to a better world.

With a wide variety of 'rewards', incentives for donating, such as photography, weaving or floristry classes, learning the art of scything or chair making, reiki healing and massage and a whole load more, you can even be the first to use the new loo - the team have just under three weeks to raise the remaining £5000 to reach their target and receive booster funding from Cornwall Council's Climate and Nature Fund! 



## Gardening Club Report

On Sunday 4th August we had the great been enhanced. In between the two areas pleasure of visiting one of Cornwall's great there was a space of land, this is now being

delights: Cabilla Cornwall.

Instead of our usual Monday evening visit we met at 3:20pm on a Sunday afternoon. We headed out towards Cardinham, near Bodmin. A sunny evening shining the way. We were greeted by Jess, the host, and now Head Gardener at Cabilla. Jess provided us with drinks whilst we sat in a converted barn with the most relaxing, tranquil feeling. The space was airy with comfy seating, a perfectly made

table and bench with ceiling high wooden plant troughs hosting green, trailing plants.

Jess started by telling about her background which is in ecology. She is new to the role of host and Head Gardener at Cabilla: a role she is very much enjoying. Jess explained Cabilla began after the owners had spent much time in its wildness whilst recovering from mental illnesses/issues. They wanted to share the space with others who needed a safe, calming and natural environment to heal from their emotional/trauma issues. Cabilla hosts a number of retreats where wellbeing and the natural world are at the centre. The converted barn and temperate rainforest were the first to be developed but neither have had the natural, wildness taken away; it's very much

developed into a kitchen garden courtesy of Jess. The area was damp and never really dry so the garden beds are in raised beds. The area was perfect for a pond so using cardboard and wood chips the pond was created. It is a perfect home for reptiles such as frogs and newts as well as insects who enjoy the kitchen garden too.

The land is 300 acres incorporating the rainforest, farm, and barn area. The star of the farm is Gloria the Cornish black pig-she works hard on digging the ground preparing it for planting, she has been a lodger with the cows and horses but she prefers her own company.

The site is home to a handful of koyts (wooden cabins). They are set amongst the ancient oak woodland of Cabilla. They don't have any electric or plumbing but they have sky windows so the stars can be viewed uninterrupted through the night. The koyts are simplistic and extremely cosy, a great way to escape the noise of everyday life.



We wondered down to the rainforest, along a wild path of grasses, bracken, and the natural world of shrubs and trees. The rainforest itself is 100 acres, as we walked towards it Jess explained a further 25k trees have been planted to expand the area. The new trees are all native, oaks, rowans, alder, crab apple. As we walked along the pathway the view across the valley was like no other, the new trees along the backdrop of the ancient trees with the fields and moorland in the distance. Insects buzzed, butterflies and moths danced along with birds of prey soaring above us.

As we entered the rainforest we were treated to a wall/hedge which was mentioned in the Dooms Day book! What things it must have witnessed in all the time it's stood. The space we stood was a familiar sight but also a brand new one. Moss covered tree trunks surrounded by carpet of bracken leading up to a canopy of branches v leaves. The peacefulness, freshness, and calm is immediate. Jess explains the trees here have a very strong mycorrhizal network, they communicate with each other through this web of roots and their friends the fungi. The age of the ancient forest

means they have developed and established a powerful connection to share nutrients and to warn each other in times of stress.

As we strolled along the pathway the trees lined for us it was clear to see the unspoiled beauty living together in harmony. At the end of the path was a viewpoint across the land with the trees giving a natural picture frame with their leaves.

We made our way down to the waterside, a crystal clear stream which is drinkable. Nestled in the rainforest is an old mining area, a counting house which is now home to a sauna. The Cabilla retreats include use of the sauna and the stream; a secluded, quiet space to clear busy minds.

As we walked up the sunset dappled path the ground became a mirror image of the canopy above. The Mother Tree, an ancient oak who has produced the vast majority of all the oaks in the rainforest stands proudly at the gateway to the clearing before we walk back to the start.

This evening was different, a gem in Cornwall, a delightful, untouched landmark completely off-gird where you feel connected to the natural world.



## THIRTEEN+ YEARS OF WILDLIFE WATCHING IN THE PARISH OF ST. IVE

Since moving to the Parish at the end of 2009, I have been photographing and recording the wildlife which I see at my home on the edge of Pensilva on a daily basis. This month I am looking at a mammal which we only ever see on our camera traps...



...THE BADGER.


Badgers are sporadic, but fairly frequent visitors to the wooded parts of our patch. With its proneness to falling prey to bovine TB, it is a controversial member of our wildlife community and it would not be appropriate to talk about them without addressing these issues. I will start by looking at the animal itself and then look at their part in the spread of bovine TB, with particular reference to the recent results from a Cornish research project.

The European badger with its distinctive black and white stripes on its head, is the largest remaining land carnivore in the UK. It is found throughout the mainland, but absent from most islands, including Cornwall's Isles of Scilly. It is a member of the mustelid family along with stoats and weasels. They live in large family groups of up to 30 individuals in underground tunnels known as setts. They are obsessively clean, frequently clearing out old bedding and replacing it with new dry leaves and grass. A short distance away from the sett, they will dig a pit which is used as a toilet. As well as digging tunnels, their strong front paws are used to dig for food. In addition to this main sett, they may have other smaller ones to use when moving around their territory.

Earthworms can form from 50% to 80% of their diet, which also includes insects, bulbs, small mammals, blackberries, grain, carrion and windfall fruit. They are also the UK mammal most capable of taking a hedgehog, using their thick long claws to get passed the hedgehog's spines. This doesn't make them that popular with the British public, but they are a long established part of the ecology of our countryside and there is no evidence to indicate that this is the main cause of the hedgehog's current slump in numbers.

Badgers can mate throughout the year, though most mating happens between February and May. During courtship the male badger (boar), will relentlessly follow the female (sow), holding on by biting her neck during coupling. Following copulation, delayed implantation occurs, ensuring that all cubs are born between January and March, regardless of when mating occurred. After about 2 months in their underground nursery, litters of 2-5 cubs will emerge from the burrow and will reach maturity at about 1 year of age. Some of these will stay where they were born, whilst others disperse to establish their own territory elsewhere.

Although less active in winter, badgers do not hibernate, as is illustrated by this graph showing badger sightings during my first 10 years here.



Badgers are a protected species, making badger baiting and digging illegal. In 1992 this was consolidated by making the damaging or blocking of their setts illegal as well. Unusually, this protection is due to long standing species specific human persecution, rather than natural threats such as climate change. Despite 50,000 badgers being killed on our roads annually, this legislation has increased their population bringing it in line with that of the fox and brings us to the second part of this article.

#### Badgers and Bovine TB.

Although most bovine TB transmission on farms is between cows, most countries have a native species which become the main (but not the only) interface between domestic cattle and the transfer of bovine TB from the wild. In some for example it is short tailed deer here it is the European badger. It could equally be argued that this interface works both ways with the wild species and the domestic, re-infecting each other. However, the effect this has on the farmers is devastating both emotionally and in business terms and should not be underestimated.

Regular testing of cattle for bovine TB has considerably improved the situation, but is very stressful for farmers who never know when it might appear again, making them slaughter some animals and unable to sell others so putting a huge strain on their livelihoods.

I always found it difficult to understand why domestic cattle were not vaccinated (as such a thing *does* exist). However, this is because it interferes with bovine TB test results so diminishing the effectiveness of the testing system which is the only current means of control.

Licensed culling of badger setts in areas where bovine TB is rife, was tried and proved to be counterproductive. This only served to drive out badgers who then moved on to infect new areas. Despite these well documented results, I understand that a license for another cull has recently been authorised.

Although inoculating cattle would be easier and more complete, the next best solution would be to inoculate the badgers. Some of you may have heard on the local news, that just such a trial in Cornwall has recently reported positive results. The study was supported and partly funded by local farmers. Twelve farms were involved with Imperial College London analysing the results to answer the farmers' questions around the practicality and effectiveness of vaccination. The recent paper publishing the results reported the number of badgers testing positive for bovine TB fell from 16% to 0%, with the percentage of local badgers vaccinated estimated to be 74%. They are calling for larger scale studies to be funded in order to establish whether this can be replicated on a larger scale.

Keith Truscott, founder of the Mid Cornwall Badger Vaccination Farmers Group and senior author on the report said: "We need a solution to tackle bovine tuberculosis - as a cattle farmer, I'm living with the constant worry that one of our cows might test positive for the disease, so doing nothing is not an option."



Professor Rosie Woodroffe, project lead and researcher at ZSL's Institute of Zoology said: "Our hope is that this work will help to move TB control into a place where farmers and wildlife groups can work together towards this shared goal."

Let's hope that this glimmer of hope will blossom into a long term solution for the sake of both the farmers and our wildlife.

Given this rather more serious note than usual, don't forget to look out for all our wonderful wildlife - you may even be lucky enough to see a badger in your garden at dusk - I will be very jealous if you do!
